A Note from the General Manager

With great anticipation, the RDC year-round team is looking forward to your return in 2024!

This past season was a continuation of the great momentum we felt in our first full year of operation since 2019. Building on the success of 2022 and the many lessons learned, (mostly by me!), the 2023 season was a great success both in terms of guest satisfaction and feedback and in regards to the financial performance of the Camp.

Our team and our guests were particularly challenged with the weather in 2023. We experienced stretches of extreme heat and humidity as well as frequent deluges of rain. The housekeeping and outside crew teams worked through these challenging conditions with great attitudes and commitment to get the job done well. The outside crew raised the docks and weighed them down several times throughout the season to adjust to the very high-water level in the lake. The Rec Staff was extremely adept at changing schedules on a second's notice to ensure a full schedule of activities each week of the summer. RDC guests were very stoic and managed through the unpredictable weather with grace and patience, many telling me that a day at Camp in the rain was better than a day spent anywhere else!

New to our programming in 2023 was our partnership with Squam Lakes Association. As part of their outreach to the community, various speakers presented on Wednesday evenings. In addition, they offered a full day hike and a shoreline snorkeling expedition. We look forward to continuing to share the wonderful SLA programs with our guests.

I'd like to take a moment to commend the 2047 Committee for their hard work this past year! Just a few of their accomplishments; an energy audit was completed by Resilient Building Group. This audit was 75% funded through the Community Development Finance Authority (CDFA). We are working through their energy savings recommendation in preparation of submitting a REAP grant application to assist with funding these projects. We are looking at solar opportunities both on Camp and community solar farms. A relationship was established with Vanguard Renewables to collect, compost, and recycle our food waste—95% of the methane gas collected from 18 tons of food waste was converted to renewable energy! We are excited to build on the success of the committee efforts in our goal to reach carbon neutrality by our one hundred-fiftieth anniversary.

The Culinary Team led by Executive Chef Brandi Edinger demonstrated a commitment to serving the best quality food and produce available while working to build consistency and the skill level of the team. We were heartened by the numerous compliments received throughout the season and we are inspired to continue to develop the culinary program of RDC.

As we look ahead to the 2024 season, and in support of Miss Bacon's wish that friendliness and respect should be an outstanding feature of the Camp, I'd like to share a quote taken from *Roots and Recollections*: Mrs. Armstrong had high standards of behavior not only from her employees but for her guests as well. Sydney Lovett remembers, "Mrs. Armstrong ruled by non-direction. All she did was pretend that people knew how they were to behave and how life was to be led and she never seemed to give any instruction." Please consider this a gentle reminder that civility is important and an inherent part of RDC's history. We ask that all guests be considerate of your fellow campers in all manners and circumstance.



Forever Fund

The RDC Forever Fund was created in response to an outpouring of support from our guests and a desire to help RDC weather the challenges of the 2020 closure. A community fund is not a new concept at RDC. In the early days of Deephaven, its founder Alice Mabel Bacon and her guests established a communal collection which she kept in a ginger jar and used to purchase supplies. Contributions to the present day Forever Fund go towards preserving Camp and our cottages as well as projects that help continue RDC's longtime traditions such as the annual ice harvest and calendar mailing. In 2023, we received donations in the amount of \$13,438, and we are so grateful for these continued contributions from our guests and shareholders to help support RDC's ongoing yearly operating expenses. RDC Charitable Giving

RDC makes a difference in the greater Holderness, NH region. In 2023, we donated \$22,600 to 22 community-based organizations ranging from environmental groups to emergency and social services. It's a welcome opportunity to give back to the local community.

The Squam Environmental Preservation Fund (SEPF) provides another opportunity for giving on a larger scale to assist with the conservation of Squam Lake and its watershed. Ongoing, generous tax deductible gifts from the RDC community since the creation of the fund in 1997 have generated \$580,086. Thank you to all donors. In 2023, you gave \$27,106 to the SEPF!

How we all adore hiking Rattlesnake Mountain. It is a destination for visitors to the region and cherished by locals and RDC guests. The Bridle Path trail has suffered from this adoration and the Squam Lakes Association set out to remedy severe erosion and compaction. Restoration of the Bridle Trail

was completed early this summer with the help of the SEPF. Trail stabilization techniques were thoughtfully installed and should improve the local environment and hiking experience.

In addition, SEPF contributed to the Loon Preservation Committee's Squam Lake Loon Initiative. This initiative supports increased water quality and loon monitoring, study of survival and reproductive success of Squam's loons, causes of nest failure, loon rescues and bird banding, analyses of blood and feather samples, and ongoing management and outreach. It was a rare treat to have a baby chick and mom settled into the RDC shoreline late this summer.

Finally, SEPF contributed to the ongoing work of the Squam Lakes Conservation Society to secure land in the Squam watershed for protection of the natural environment.

We are good neighbors and stewards!

The SEPF fund is managed for RDC by the New Hampshire Charitable Foundation as a donor-designated fund. A history of awarded SEPF grants is posted on our website at www.RDCsquam.com/sepf-history.html. RDC annually contributes 5% of our Store and Zodiac revenue to the SEPF fund.

Building & Grounds Committee Report

With the major multi-year septic project finally complete, capital planning and budgeting have turned to three areas of focus for 2024:

"Mixed-Use Facilities" Study and Improvements

The two dining halls and two lodges in Camp each accommodate a mix of uses, as defined by the building code—namely assembly and sleeping. RDC has engaged Samyn-D'Elia Architects of Holderness to help us study these facilities with regard to life safety (egress, fire protection, etc.), structural condition, weather-resistance, accessibility, and user comfort and experience. Together, we are evaluating, budgeting, and planning potential improvements in these areas at these facilities. The study is still in progress, and improvements will likely be phased over several years, but you can expect to see at least some initial touches when you get to Camp this summer.

Energy Efficiency and Carbon Reduction

A portion of the 2024 capital budget will fund projects supporting RDC's "2047 Initiative" to minimize energy usage, fossil fuels consumption, and carbon emissions, by Camp's 150th anniversary in 2047. Near-term capital projects in this area include on-site solar arrays to produce 25% of RDC's electricity, improvements to the envelope and building systems at Roswell (the year-round winterized office—one of Camp's largest energy consumers), and upgrades to the commercial kitchen equipment, mechanical systems, and lighting in the dining halls.

General Projects

We will continue to make improvements at facilities throughout Camp, especially focusing on building maintenance and the high-impact guest-experience areas of cottage kitchenettes and bathrooms. We are not currently planning any major cottage renovations or rebuilds.

Once again, RDC will host "Design Assembly" in early June—an intensive eight-day student design-and-build program. Last year's Assembly, the first to take place in New Hampshire, created the new composting privy on Loon Island. Founded in 2012, this community-oriented, hands-on-learning program fits nicely with RDC's long history of providing opportunities for growth and discovery to college-age students. 2023 Loon Report

2023 was an exciting year in loon news on Squam, with the first chick in 20 years to fledge from the waters around RDC! Both of the pair members were back this year: the male logged his fourth year in the territory, while the remarkable, long-time RDC female turned at least 31 years old this year, continuing her reign as the oldest banded loon on Squam. The pair certainly rose to the occasion this year! A first nesting attempt failed after a predator destroyed the nest, but the pair tried again and hatched a chick in early August. The chick thrived under the assiduous care of its parents, and its parents were still taking good care of it in early November. The last chick to fledge from this part of the lake was in 2003 (hatched from a different female), and the current RDC female last successfully fledged a chick here in 2002. Hopefully both pair members will return next year for an encore performance of raising another chick!



The chick by RDC was one of three chicks that fledged on Squam Lake this summer. Two other chicks hatched but, sadly, did not survive. Squam had fewer nesting pairs of loons this summer, and it seems likely that the rainy summer played a part, discouraging some pairs from nesting. In addition, one nest on Squam was likely lost due to a rapid rise in water levels that flooded the nest. While 2023 was a poor year for loon reproductive success on Squam, Squam was not the only lake that struggled this year: the rainy weather impacted loon breeding success statewide.

The Loon Preservation Committee (LPC) floated nine nesting rafts for Squam's loons again this year, and three of the five chicks hatched on the lake came from these rafts. We placed protective signs and ropes around loon nests, and chicks were protected by LPC's orange "Caution: Loon Chicks" signs. In addition to the three fledged chicks on Squam Lake, the loon pair on Little Squam pulled off an early-August hatch on their third nesting attempt and successfully raised a chick as well.

Sadly, two adult loons were documented to have died on the Squam Lakes this past year. One died from injuries sustained in a conflict with another loon, and the other died of lead poisoning. The lead poisoned loon was collected on Little Squam but was not one of the Little Squam pair. This loon was not banded, so we do not know where it came from, but it was a sad victim of the ongoing use of lead fishing tackle, despite laws restricting the sale and use of lead tackle. Please help spread the word of the dangers of lead and encourage anglers to use only non-lead fishing tackle—thank you for your help!

The RDC chick was such a highlight this summer, and LPC will continue our work to understand, protect, and restore Squam's loon population. We are very grateful to the RDC community and the Squam Environmental Preservation Fund for your support of Squam's loons and the work of LPC—Thank You! All best wishes to the RDC community!

2023 Bald Eagle Report

Our Bald Eagle pair decided to move house this year and skipped town (and changed county). After several years of nesting in Moultonborough in Carroll County (both on eastern Long Island and on Loon Island) they built a new nest on a super-canopy pine further west on Long Island

and in the town of Center Harbor (in Belknap County). Of course, the eagles are oblivious to the town and county boundaries and just picked a suitable tree in their territory.


They did start nest building at the old tree on Long Island in March, but after failing to get the sticks to stay in place, they gave up and started afresh. This new tree is huge and provided a nice stable base. The pair seemed to relish being able to build a substantial nest. The tree they used for several years on Long Island was a pretty flimsy affair and the, at-bestprecarious, nest would fall apart by the end of the season.

All went well and the pair started incubating on the last day of March. Two chicks hatched in early May and both fledged successfully in July–the 30th and 31st chick to be raised on Squam since 2003.

Overall, the Bald Eagle population continues to flourish throughout the state. In 2023, NH Audubon staff and field volunteers confirmed 109 territorial pairs in NH, up 18% compared to 2022. We documented **76 pairs incubating**, up more than 5% from 2022. We counted 61 successful nests, and we tallied 93 young fledged, the latter up nearly 11% over the 84 fledglings produced in 2022. This year's breeding season totals for all categories set new state-record highs for the post-DDT era.



Brand new for 2024 is the addition of four Malibu Two sit on top double kayaks. Sit on top kayaks are comfortable, stable, easy to paddle, and now built for two! The sit on top kayaks do not have cockpits to collect rainwater or spiders, so you can head out and enjoy paddling on Squam with little effort. Sit on top kayaks also offer the benefit of hopping on and off easily for a swim.

Dining Hall Etiquette

The RDC dining halls are an integral part of the overall Camp experience. In the spirit of this, we would like to remind you of some important dining hall guidelines. While the dining hall dress code has become more relaxed over the last several decades, RDC is proud of its time-honored custom of dressing



for dinner. For many guests, this is an important and traditional aspect of their RDC experience. We would like to remind all of our guests of the RDC dress code and request that you follow these simple guidelines while inside the dining hall. Young children should be supervised at all times by an adult. Children should refrain from running for the safety of all. To help maintain the sense of community and camaraderie while at meals, we would also like to remind you to please not use cell phones or laptops while in the Camp dining halls. Please see below for guidance on dinner attire.

Dress code:

No caps, tank tops, bathing suits or bare feet at any meal. Casual sportswear is acceptable for breakfast and lunch but more appropriate dress is recommended for dinner (non-athletic shorts, pants, collared shirt for men; dresses, skirts, pants, non-athletic shorts for women).

We will be able to serve you more efficiently if your form is filled out completely and clearly; newspapers must be ordered at least seven days prior to your arrival; golf cart rentals are available only for guests with mobility issues; weekly boat rentals may be reserved prior to your arrival; daily rentals may be requested upon your arrival.

To request a reservation, please complete the enclosed Reservation Request Form or go online to **RDCsquam.com/reservations**. Reservations are booked according to seniority. To give yourself the best opportunity to receive the cottages and dates of your choice, your request must be received before **FEBRUARY 15**.

RDC's 2024 season will begin **Thursday, May 30**, and end **Friday, September 13**.

Off-Peak Season Discounts

Cottage stays of five nights or more, May 30 through June 21 and August 31 through September 12, qualify for our off-peak discount. This 20% discount applies to the cottage base rate only. Discounted rates do not apply to lodge rooms or overages.

Arrival and Departure times

Arriving guests should not enter their accommodations before registering at the office. **Check-in** begins at 4 p.m. Please **check-out** by 10 a.m.

Both Rockywold and Deephaven dining halls will offer traditional seating with a 90-minute serving time for each meal. Please note dining hall hours are subject to change throughout the season. Hours are posted outside each dining hall. Take-out containers will be available for those wishing to enjoy their meals outside the dining hall. Mid-day meals on departure and arrival days are not included in weekly rates. Bagged lunches are available to guests who give the dining hall a day's notice before departure.

Please notify Camp of any food allergies or dietary restrictions on your reservation request form and by emailing RDC@RDCsquam.com. Gluten-free, dairy-free, and vegetarian options are available at each meal.

Daily Services

We offer full daily housekeeping and outside crew services. If you prefer a lower-contact experience and would like to opt-out of any portion of these services, you may notify our office staff at any time.

Reservations in the Lodges & Rock Office Rooms

After careful consideration, the RDC Board of Directors has determined that 2024 is the right time to return Greenwood Lodge and the Long House to their historical and intended use as community lodging spaces. They are the more affordable and flexible options for guests, have been valuable places to welcome newcomers, and importantly, they facilitate the stays of those who need more

handicap accessible accommodations. Reservations in the lodges will be subject to a two-night minimum stay, and the usual seniority and priority guidelines will apply. The lodges are available to guests 13 years of age and older. Lodge guests will be seated at a community table in the dining hall unless otherwise requested.

The Rock Office Rooms are available for guests of all ages. These rooms are located above the Rockywold Office and Library. Rock Office offers rooms with single, double and triple occupancy and shared bath. They can be rented individually with a two-night minimum.

Guests staying in the lodges or other rooms rented by the day are entitled to lunch on their day of departure. These guests must, however, check out of their room(s) before the lunch hour begins, no later than 12:30 p.m.

2024 RATES

All cottages enjoy a private dock on Squam Lake, a fireplace, a screened-in porch, and an old-fashioned icebox. Our Full American Plan includes lodging, all meals, daily housekeeping, organized activities, and use of recreational facilities, including eight clay tennis courts, three pickleball courts, a basketball court, and a ball field. During peak season, reservations are made on a weekly basis for cottages. Cottages may be rented for less than a week during off-peak season, subject to a three-night minimum stay. Lodge rooms require a two-night minimum stay throughout the full season. There are no additional service charges. Gratuities are not required, but guests are welcome to reward employees for exceptional service.

OVERAGES

Most cottages accommodate guests beyond the minimal occupancy; such persons are charged the "Weekly Overage Rate" of \$1,225 or a "Daily Overage Rate" of \$175 per night. Overage Rates include three meals per day and organized activities. The Overage Rate for children ages 3-9 is 50% off the above Overage Rate. There is no overage charge for children under 3 years of age.

LODGE & ROCK OFFICE ROOM RATES

The daily rate covers our Full American Plan charges and overages apply as described above. Reservations in the lodges and Rock Office rooms are subject to a two-night minimum stay. (Discounted rate periods apply to cottages only.)

GENERAL INFORMATION

- Arrival and Departure times: Check-in begins at 4 p.m., and check-out is 10 a.m. To ensure your accommodation has been properly cleaned, sanitized, and inspected, arriving guests should not enter their lodging facility before registering at the office.
 Mid-day meals on departure and arrival days are not included in weekly rates. Bagged lunches are available to guests who give the dining hall a day's notice before departure.
- A 20% deposit, received within 30 days from the date of our offer letter, is required to confirm a reservation.
- Cancellation Policy: If a cancellation is made prior to May 15, 50% of the deposit will be refunded. Reservations canceled after May 15 and prior to a month of expected arrival will lose the full 20% deposit. Reservations canceled within one month of expected arrival will be responsible for 50% of the total bill if the resulting vacancy is not filled. Reservations canceled within two weeks of expected arrival will be responsible for 100% of the total bill if the resulting vacancy is not filled.
- New Hampshire Rooms and Meals Tax of 8.5% is added to lodging and meal charges.
- **Gratuities:** Unlike many other resorts, RDC does not add a service charge to guest bills; however, guests may wish to reward employees for exceptional service. Gratuity envelopes are available in both offices.
- There are no additional service charges.
- RDC's Recreation Programs, with activities for all ages, begins June 9 and ends August 30.
- A morning playgroup, called Wee Campers, is provided from June 10 to August 30 for children 3 to 6 years of age, Monday Friday, 9:30 a.m. 12 noon. (Refer to RDC's Guest Manual for details.)
- Pets cannot be accommodated except during "Dog Week", Saturday, September 7 to Friday, September 13. Sorry!
- We do not accept credit cards. Cash or check only, please!

RDC Boathouse Update Additional Charges

All rentals have limited availability. Weekly boat and golf cart rentals may be reserved prior to your arrival. Cancellations for weeklong boat rentals must be called into the office by 4 p.m. the day before your arrival. There will be a one-day rental charge for each cancelled boat after delivery. Daily rentals may be requested upon your arrival and will be provided if available. For boat

Private Cottage in the Woods

The Log House is available June 29 through September 15 and is located off of Pinehurst Road, a quarter of a mile from Camps' main entrance. This woodland cottage is perfect for a bit of seclusion while still enjoying the close proximity to Camp life. With a minimum occupancy of four, this fully furnished two-bedroom, two-bathroom cottage includes a well-equipped kitchen, wood stove, washer & dryer, large screened-in porch, and outdoor deck.

Peak Season Rental includes: WiFi, dock access in Camp, organized activities, and use of all recreational facilities including clay tennis courts, basketball court, pickleball courts, and ball field.

Dining Hall access: Meals are available by request on a daily basis for an additional fee. Breakfast is \$14.00, lunch is \$17.00, and dinner is \$27.00 per person. All rates are subject to New Hampshire Rooms and Meals Tax of 8.5%.

Overage Charges: Log House rental accommodates guests beyond the fourperson minimal occupancy; such persons are charged a **Weekly Overage Rate** or **Daily Overage Rate**.

The rate for children ages 3-9 is 50% off the Overage Rates. There is no overage charge for children under 3 years of age.

Weekly Overage per Person: \$910.00 Daily Overage per Person: \$130.00

Reservations are made outside of RDC's normal reservation process and booked on a weekly basis during peak season and with shorter stays available off season. Overage rates apply beyond minimum occupancy. All rates are subject to New Hampshire Rooms and Meals Tax of 8.5%.



RDC's Reservation Process:

We frequently receive multiple requests for the same accommodations in the same time periods, especially in July and August. Potential conflicts are resolved on the basis of priority and seniority (defined below).

In order to receive early consideration for an accommodation, we must receive a written request prior to **February 15**. Requests received after **February 15** will be honored but only after filling all those received before the deadline. Typically, availability becomes quite limited as the summer approaches. We ask that all guests use the Reservation Request Form on the reverse side of this paper.

When reservation bookings begin on February 15, the order in which reservations are placed is as follows:

- 1) All "priority" guests.
- 2) Guests with the most "seniority credit" to guests with the least seniority credit.

(Additional credit is given to guests staying for two or more consecutive weeks in the same accommodation.)

Priority:

Guests who have reserved the same accommodation during the same time period for three consecutive years earn what is called a priority. A guest having priority on a particular accommodation will be given the first option to reserve that accommodation for the appropriate time period.

Seniority Credit:

Guests receive one seniority credit for each year in which they were guests in camp for one week or longer after the age of 25. This credit applies whether or not the individual has paid an RDC bill. No credit is given for partial-week stays. An additional credit is granted to guests who stayed at RDC prior to age 25, current RDC shareholders receive one additional credit, and a further credit is granted to those guests who served as an employee for at least one full season. A maximum of one seniority credit per season is allowed for any individual.

- If the accommodation requested is available, an offer letter will be sent to you with a request for a 20% deposit. If we receive your deposit within 30 days from the date of the offer letter your reservation is confirmed.
- If the accommodation requested is not available, a staff member will attempt to contact you to discuss alternatives. Please make sure we can reach you in **February and early March** by giving us current work and home phone numbers, e-mail addresses and an alternative contact person should you be away!
- If the accommodation requested is not available, and no alternatives exist, you will be notified and put on a waiting list if you wish.

Cancellation Policy:

- If a cancellation is made prior to May 15, 50% of the deposit will be refunded.
- Reservations canceled after May 15 and prior to a month of expected arrival will lose the full 20% deposit.
- Reservations canceled within one month of expected arrival will be responsible for 50% of the total bill if the resulting vacancy is not filled.
- Reservations canceled within two weeks of expected arrival will be responsible for 100% of the total bill if the resulting vacancy is not filled.

FACILITY INFORMATION - RDC has multiple meeting/function facilities:

The Rockywold and Deephaven Dining Halls can be used for a wide variety of activities and events. Both the Rockywold and Deephaven Dining Halls can comfortably seat 250 people.

The Playhouse is a pavilion with a raised stage, suitable for entertainment, exhibits, and dances.

The Ballfield & Pavilion are available for outdoor gatherings, including field games, special picnics, and barbecues.

The Long House is a lodge situated on the Deephaven point providing spectacular views of the Squam Mountain Range and Red Hill. It has a common area that can accommodate up to 100 people theater seating, 75 people for receptions, and 60 people for banquets.

Greenwood Lodge is located on the Rockywold side of Camp and provides views of the lake and its islands. The common area can accommodate 45 people theater seating and 60 people for receptions (using porches).

Deephaven Conference Room is adjacent to the Deephaven Office. The room can accommodate 25 people in a classroom or 40 people in theater seating.

RDC's larger cottages can also be used as small meeting facilities.

Kellogg (Rec Hall) is connected to the Playhouse and located in the center of Camp. The room is equipped with a large TV, AC/heat and can accommodate up to 25 people.

The Commons is located in the center of Camp and in close proximity to the Playhouse. Within The Commons is a meeting room that opens to a large screened-in porch. It is equipped with a 75" screen TV, sound system, AC/heat and can accommodate 30-50 people.
